## Jack Promises Help

When reached in his offices Tuesday morning, Borough President Hulan E. Jack told the Amsterdam News he had received the parents' letter and was very proud of their "display of civic, duty." He also stated that he had asked the Board of Elections to increase staffs in branch offices.
